Dates for your Diary

28/03/24—Easter Fair

Reception: This week, Reception read the classic tale, 'Jack and the Beanstalk'. The story inspired the children to produce beautiful pieces of literacy this week, whilst describing the furious giant! Jack's beanstalk even inspired us to get our measuring stick out in maths. We've planted magic beans and grown our own beanstalks. It was lots of fun using cubes and paperclips to measure how tall they are. We even measured ourselves to see who is the shortest and tallest in our class. For litter picking day, we got stuck in with our new litter grabbers and helped clean up our school.

Nursery: This week, children have explored changes over time through the use of Tadpoles Promise story. We have explored how tadpoles and caterpillars change over time. We have observed what frogspawn is and what it looks like before using different resources to make frogspawn. We even explored the inside of a kiwi before using the kiwi's to create a kiwi frog for Tasty Tuesday. In maths, we loved this week's nursery rhyme, five speckled frogs, we used prompts to act out and role play the nursery rhyme, the children have demonstrate some fantastic mathematical reasoning skills to explain what happens each time a frog jumps into the water.

Reminders

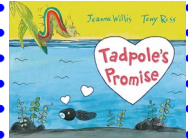
- Children in Reception should bring their school bag **EVERY** day.

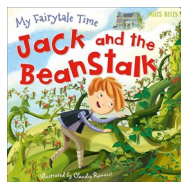

How to support your child with reading at home:

- Enjoy reading together. Find a comfortable, quiet place to read
- Make reading part of your daily routine.
- Listen to your child reads aloud daily. Try for 10 minutes.
- Read to your child, enjoying books together and showing them how an expert reads.

Questions to ask your child when reading at home:

- What do you think this book is going to be about?
- Who are the main characters?
- What do you think will happen next?
- Why did they do that?
- Do you like this book? Why?
- What was the best / funniest / saddest part of the story?
- What does the picture tell you?
